Irregularities to Watch For

While most verbs follow the regular patterns, several common verbs are irregular in the imperfect:

- Decir – dije, dijiste, dijo, dijimos, dijisteis, dijeron (note the stem change)
- Haber – había, habías, había, habíamos, habíais, habían
- Ir – iba, ibas, iba, íbamos, ibais, iban
- Ver – veía, veías, veía, veíamos, veíais, veían

Common Mistakes and How to Avoid Them
