Key Concepts You Must Master

1. Demographic Transition Model (DTM)

The DTM explains how populations shift from high birth and death rates to low birth and death rates as a country develops. The four stages are:

1. Stage /1 – High Stationary: High birth and death rates; population growth is minimal.
